Foreword

The History of Coosa Lodge

Coosa Lodge was born from the consolidation of three older lodges - Cherokee Lodge #50, Achunanchi Lodge #135, and Kaskanampo Lodge #310 - to serve the newly formed Greater Alabama Council in 2000. But before 2000, these Lodges had fellowships to make the transition that much smoother.

In 1998, the Lodge Executive Committees of Achunanchi, Cherokee, and Kaskanampo voted to hold a Tri-Lodge Fellowship to be held at in the Birmingham Area Council at Camp Winnataska. This event was in turned staff by all three Lodges. We also formed the Consolidation Committee to also help the transition into the new lodge. The Committee was made up of equal membership by the three Lodges to select the new Lodge name, totem, and flap design. After long deliberation, Coosa Lodge was chosen to be the new Lodge name due a group of indigenous Native Americans, the Coosa people. The Red Shouldered Hawk, an endangered, species native to the area, was chosen as the totem for our new Lodge. Our first lodge flap was designed and incorporated elements from all of the past lodges.

In 1999, the three lodges' leadership traveled together to the National Leadership Summit held in Fort Collins, Colorado. On this trip, the first slate of Coosa Lodge officers were selected. In September of 1999, the first Coosa Lodge event - Fellowship Pow Wow - happened at Camp Comer. On January 1, 2000, Coosa Lodge was official formed.

In 2000, Coosa Lodge elected David Self as the first Coosa Lodge Chief and selected Dr. James Flatt and Mr. Gene Wright as the first Coosa Lodge Adviser and Coosa Lodge Professional Adviser, respectively. Coosa Lodge used the previous council boundaries to establish a tribe structure, a level between lodge and chapter, to help manage the transition. Coosa Lodge served

as host lodge for the SR-8B Conclave at Camp Sequoyah, where the last Achunanchi Lodge Chief, Seth Hill, was elected SR-8B Section Chief to preside over the 2001 SR-8B Conclave. Later that year, Coosa Lodge attended the National Order of the Arrow Conference at the University of Tennessee with a contingent of 40+ Arrowmen. At the 2000 NOAC, Coosa Lodge won the Spirit Award and was named the National Champions in Basketball. Additionally, Coosa Lodge was named a National Quality Lodge.

In 2001, Coosa Lodge won Best All Around Lodge at the Final SR-8B Conclave, and was again selected to be a National Quality Lodge. 2002 brought us another great year. Coosa Lodge was yet again named as a National Quality Lodge. At the SR-6S Conclave, Coosa Lodge won the Quest for the Golden Arrow and the Section Recognition Award. Later on in 2002, Coosa Lodge took a contingent of 70+ Arrowmen to the National Order of the Arrow Conference at Indiana University. Where the Great Bana Sequester took place. All week the lodge gathered bananas for Founders' Day Banana Pudding, unfortunately the bananas were stored in a spare dorm room that was 100 degrees, let's just say they were pretty ripe.

2002 - @todo

In 2003, Coosa Lodge was again named a National Quality Lodge. At the SR-65 Conclave, Coosa won the Quest for the Golden Arrow and shared the Section Recognition Award. Also at Conclave, Jim Ellison was elected the SR-6S Section Vice-Chief. Mr. Keith Swedenburg was named as Coosa Lodge's second Professional Adviser.

2004 was a breakout year for Coosa Lodge. Yet again Coosa Lodge was named a National Quality Lodge. Coosa Lodge was awarded the

National Service Award, one of only eight that were awarded that year. Coosa Lodge served as host lodge for the SR-6S Conclave at Camp Comer. At Conclave, Coosa won the Section Recognition Award for the third straight year and Jim Ellison was elected SR-6S Section Chief to preside over the 2005 Conclave. Coosa Lodge also led a contingent of 60+ Arrowmen to the 2004 NOAC at Iowa State University and won the Lodge Spirit Award. Then at Fall Fellowship, Mr. Greg Moore was named the second Lodge Adviser.

In 2005, Coosa Lodge was again chosen as a National Quality Lodge. Coosa won the Section Recognition Award for the fourth straight year at the SR-6S Conclave. Coosa Lodge also ordered a couple too many pizzas at the Talladega Encampment resulting in The Great Pizza Incident. Additionally, Coosa Lodge had of its most memorable events in its whole entire existence, the Coosa Lodge Luau. Coosa Lodge also hosted one day projects with Habitat for Humanity. In 2005, Coosa Lodge had grown and eliminated the tribe system, so they placed two new positions on the LEC, the North and South Vice Chiefs.

In 2006, we changed our Spring Fellowship, and hosted our first American Indian Seminar. We scheduled one day service projects in Huntsville, Birmingham, and Anniston. Coosa Lodge sent a contingent of 60+ Arrowmen to the 2006 NOAC at Michigan State University where they won the Lodge Spirit Award and second place in Lodgeball. Later that year Mr. Jackie Pettit became Coosa Lodge's third Professional Adviser. In 2007, Coosa Lodge was named a National Quality Lodge. At Conclave, Coosa Lodge won the final Section Recognition Award for SR-6S, and James Tarbox and Will Jackson were elected SR-6S Section Chief and SR-6S Section Secretary, respectively. Coosa Lodge sent a contingent of 10 Arrowmen to the National Conservation and Leadership Summit. In 2007, Coosa Lodge began dating their Standard Lodge and Brotherhood flaps.

In 2008, Coosa Lodge again became a National Quality Lodge. James Tarbox was elected the SR-9 Section Chief and Dr. James Flatt was named the Section Adviser. Coosa Lodge was awarded the E. Urner Goodman National Camping Award which was one of only 8 awarded that year. To facilitate with ArrowCorps5, a nationwide service

project, Coosa Lodge created HawkCorps at Camp Tranquility. Coosa Lodge sent 35+ Arrowmen to the various ArrowCorps5 sites. At Fall Fellowship Col Kent Jackson was named as the third Lodge Adviser, and Mr. Seth Hill, past Achunanchi Lodge Chief, was named the fourth Professional Adviser.

In 2009, Coosa Lodge was again named a National Quality Lodge. Coosa hosted the Inaugural SR-9 Conclave at Camp Comer, and in preparation Coosa Lodge designed, financed, and built the Flatt Rock Arena at Camp Comer. Mr. Greg Moore was named SR-9 Associate Section Adviser. Coosa Lodge sent a contingent of 80+ Arrowmen to NOAC at Indiana University where James Tarbox served as the 2009 NOAC Vice Chief for Shows. Coosa, also, won the award for Best Lodge Display with the tremendous effort and leadership by Davis Faulkner and Mr. Jon Ingram. Coosa Shows was asked to handle the Council Encampment Show. Coosa Lodge also helped the Properties Committee work to reopen Camp Jackson for larger events. HawkCorps gathered and did service at Camp Tranquility. Dr. James Flatt and Mr. Keith Swedenburg were awarded the Distinguished Service Award. Mr Doug Jackson became the fifth Coosa Lodge Professional Adviser.

In 2010, Coosa Lodge was named a National Quality Lodge. At National Jamboree, Dr. James Flatt was the Lead Advisor for the PaceSetters program with James Tarbox serving as his deputy. HawkCorps gathered and did service at Camp Tranquility. Coosa Lodge started the service flaps. In 2011, Coosa Lodge was again named a National Quality Lodge meaning that eleven years out of the twelve Coosa Lodge was in existence. At Conclave, N.G. Moore was elected as the SR-9 Section Vice Chief. Coosa Lodge also sent a contingent to both SummitCorps and Indian Summer. As our Lodge kept growing, we again changed our Lodge structure to eliminate the Vice Chief of the North and South, and to give Chapter Chiefs to have a vote on the LEC without affecting quorum. At Fall Fellowship, Mr. Ed O'Neal and Mr. Joey Kiker, past Coosa Lodge Chief, became the fourth Lodge Adviser and sixth Professional Adviser, respectively.

In 2012, Coosa Lodge achieved Gold on the new Journey to Excellence system. Coosa Lodge sent a contingent of 100+ Arrowmen to NOAC at Michigan State University where our Flintstones

Themed branding was widely desired and we received Honorable Mention for Lodge Display. The Nacha Sipo Ceremonial Team placed in the Top 10 in the Nation for the Pre-Ordeal Ceremony, and Alex Pope, a multiple term Vice-Chief, placed sixth in the nation in Traditional Dancing. James Tarbox, a past Coosa Lodge Chief, was awarded the Distinguished Service Award. At Conclave, N.G. Moore was elected to a second term as SR-9 Section Vice Chief.

In 2013, the Lodge changed the American Indian Seminar to the Spring Pow Wow which was opened to the entire Council where almost 1000 were in attendance. At Conclave, we had a very successful spirit effort with the theme "The Hawking Dead", and N.G. Moore was elected as SR-9 Section Chief to preside over the 2014 Conclave. At the 2013 National Jamboree, Mr. Greg Moore served as the Deputy Lead Adviser for the OA Day of Service where many Arrowmen from Coosa Lodge served.

We kicked off 2014 with the Lodge Training Summit and Winter Banquet. Dozens of members met at "Top of the Town" in Cullman for a day of training, fellowship, and shopping at the trading post. Later that evening, everyone settled in for a catered dinner as our first lodge chief, Mr. David Self, talked a bit about the impact the Order of the Arrow had on him. Later in the evening, we recognized our new Founder's Award recipients: Patric Yim, Mr. Vince Lambert, and Mr. Harry Merrill.

A few weeks later, on February 7-8, Yuchi Chapter hosted the first ceremony team retreat at Camp Westmoreland. Ceremony teams and their advisers spent the weekend training, practicing, building regalia, preparing for the upcoming induction season, and preparing for ceremony team evaluations at the upcoming conclave.

On March 21-23, 700+ staff and participants met at Camp Comer for our annual Spring Pow-Wow event. The weekend built upon its success in 2013, once again inviting participants from packs, troops, and crews across the council to spend a weekend at Camp Comer and get to know a bit about the Order of the Arrow. Coosa Shows closed the program Saturday night with an impressive closing show and Webelos crossover ceremony.

We met our brothers from SR-9 at Moundville

Archaeological Park in April for the 2014 SR-9 Conclave. Our theme for this conclave was "The Coosa Games", with patches and other memorabilia inspired by "The Hunger Games." At Conclave, the Yuchi Ceremonial Team placed first for the Pre-Ordeal Ceremony. The opening and closing shows were led by Coosa Shows with support from others across the section.

Induction weekends were held at Camp Sequoyah, Camp Comer, and Camp Westmoreland, where nearly 300 new Arrowmen were welcomed into the Order of the Arrow.

To kick off its 15th anniversary, Coosa Lodge unveiled a bold, new standard flap design at the 2014 Fall Fellowship. The design featured a patterned blue background, a simplified Coosa Lodge totem, and a more modern aesthetic.



Nearly 200 Arrowmen were in attendance for the weekend at Camp Sequoyah to recognize our new Vigil Honor recipients, elect a new slate of lodge officers, reflect upon our accomplishments in 2014, and prepare for Scoutfest.

The officers elected that weekend were Will Tidwell (Lodge Chief), Aaron Wiggs (Vice-Chief of Service), Colin Giles (Vice-Chief of Administration), Alex McDowell (Vice-Chief of Inductions), Nicholas Crenshaw (Vice-Chief of Fellowship), and John Glenn (Vice-Chief of Native American Affairs).

Upon the completion of Fall Fellowship, the new slate of officers got to work on the finishing details for the upcoming council encampment, known as ScoutFest. Coosa Lodge provided an event-wide service corps for more than 5,000 staff and participants while Coosa Shows put on their biggest show ever, complete with a fireworks display.

As 2014 drew to a close, all of our lodge officers, chapter chiefs, committee chairs, and advisers met at Camp Sumatanga for an full weekend of team building, leadership development, and

fellowship.

2015 - @todo

In 2015, we again brought another great theme to Conclave with "Coosa Legacy". At Conclave, the Yuchi Ceremonial Team placed first for the Pre-Ordeal Ceremony. We had 500+ attend our third annual Spring Pow Wow. Coosa Lodge is sending a contingent of 160+ Arrowmen to NOAC at Michigan State University where Mr. Greg Moore is receiving the Distinguished Service Award. Throughout the years we have had many serve on OA High Adventure, and NLS courses as well as NLATS courses.

2016 - @todo

On April 15-17, the lodge attended the annual SR-9 Conclave at Camp Rainey Mountain. The event was hosted by Mowogo Lodge.

Later that summer, the lodge participated in "NEXT: A New Century" at Indiana University. This was a national training event focused on creating a culture of growth throughout the Order of the Arrow. This conference invited a handful of key youth and adult members from each lodge to spend a week discussing how small changes can have profound effects on several key program areas in each lodge. Coosa Lodge sent Alex East, Will Hamm, Logan Doloff, Mr. Jim Colson, and Mr. Greg Crenshaw as participants. Mr. Chris Brightwell and Nicholas Crenshaw served on staff as a crew guide and video production specialist, respectively.

2017 - @todo

For the weekend of April 21-23, more than 110 members of Coosa Lodge traveled to Camp Frank G. Lumpkin near LaGrange, Ga. to join hundreds of Arrowmen from across SR-9 for the inaugural SR-9 Heartland Gathering (aka Conclave). Coosa did well, placing in ceremonies and dance competitions, administrative events, and more. Coosa Lodge youth also provided key leadership for several areas of the event, including Jesse Mayhall as CVC for AIA and Colin Giles as CVC for Shows.

2018 As the calendar turned to 2018, many of the old-timers in the lodge felt flashbacks to our first year as a lodge. In a single year, the lodge was once again set to host Conclave, attend NOAC, and provide a service corps for thousands of people at ScoutFest.

The year started at Gardendale-Mt. Vernon United Methodist Church for our annual Winter Banquet (Jan. 20). More than 120 lodge members pack themselves into the gym of the church to enjoy a meal, update our lodge rules, learn about the plans in place for the upcoming year, and recognize our new Founder's Award recipients. Guest speakers that evening included our Scout Executive, Mr. J.T. Dabbs, III, and a former lodge chief for Coosa Lodge, Will Jackson. The patch design for the event commemorated 80 years since the founding of Achunanchi Lodge.

The Founder's Award recipients for 2018 were Colin Giles and Dr. Dan Belk.

After Winter Banquet and a quick trip to Black Creek Scout Reservation for SR-9 Indian Winter (Feb. 2-4), it was time to get ready for Conclave.

In order to get Camp Comer ready for conclave, the LEC decided to move the spring induction weekend from May to March. We inducted 106 new members that weekend (March 2-4) as we tackled more than a dozen work projects across the entire camp. Two Hawk Day events followed quickly at Camp Comer (Mar. 17 and Apr. 14).

When Conclave finally arrived (Apr. 20-22), Camp Comer was ready to host 850+ Arrowmen from Georgia and Alabama as Section SR-9 celebrated its 10th anniversary with a fitting theme, "A Decade Like No Other". Teams from each lodge spent the weekend participating in a jam-packed schedule of training, fellowship, games, drum and dance, ceremonies evaluations, patch trading, and more!. Coosa Shows prepared the opening and closing shows for the weekend. The service chair for the weekend was Adler Salem. His adviser was Mr. Greg Moore.

With no induction weekend scheduled for May, the LEC voted to hold two Hawk Day events that month. One workday was held at Camp Westmoreland (May 12) and another was held at Camp Sequoyah (May 19).

Coosa Lodge spent the summer supporting camp programs at Camp Comer and Camp Sequoyah with weekly call-out ceremonies and dozens of lodge members on staff at both camps.

As the summer camp season came to a close, 46 members of Coosa Lodge loaded up and drove 400 miles north to Indiana University for the 2018 National Order of the Arrow Conference (Jul. 30 – Aug. 4). They joined 8,000+ Arrowmen from

every lodge in the country, both in person and virtually, for an inspirational and unforgettable experience full of fellowship, training, adventure, and fun. Will Hamm was the youth contingent lead. His adviser was Mr. David Murphree.

Just two weeks upon returning from NOAC, the lodge met at Camp Sequoyah for its summer induction weekend. A total of 186 candidates completed their Ordeal while 18 members attained Brotherhood.

The lodge would host two more Hawk Day events that fall at Camp Jack Wright (Sept. 8) and Camp Jackson (Oct. 20).

The Greater Alabama Council hosted 2,500 Scouts and leaders at its council encampment, named Scoutfest, at Point Mallard State Park (Nov. 2-4). Coosa Lodge was there to host the Indian Village and provide service through the Service Corps. Coosa Shows pulled out all the stops for the weekend's closing show, complete with a fireworks display and a musical performance from The Pine Hill Haints.

After a weekend off to recover from Scoutfest, the lodge met at Camp Comer once again for its annual Fall Fellowship (Nov. 16-18). More than 200 members attended the event as the lodge celebrated its accomplishments in 2018, set the stage for 2019, elected a new slate of lodge officers, and recognized its newest Vigil Honor recipients. We also thanked Mr. Jim Colson for his 3 years of service as our Lodge Adviser.

The elected officers for 2019 were Andrew Huffman (Lodge Chief), Daniel Massie (Vice-Chief of Service), Tyler Wright (Vice-Chief of Administration), Kody Purinton (Vice-Chief of Fellowship), Walker Kelley (Vice-Chief of Inductions), Jesse Mayhall (Vice-Chief of Native American Affairs), and Sam Wilson (Vice-Chief of Communications). Mr. Don Russell began his appointment as our new Lodge Adviser and Mr. David Self continued as our Staff Adviser.

A few weeks later, the new lodge officers and their advisers met at Camp Tekakwitha for the annual Lodge Leadership Retreat (Dec. 7-9). In addition to team-building games and leadership development training, they spent the weekend reviewing our performance and setting goals for the upcoming year.

The final event on a jam-packed calendar for 2018 was the annual ceremonies retreat, hosted by

Yuchi Chapter and held at Camp Westmoreland (Dec. 27-29). A total of 34 members spent the weekend focused on their skills and crafts in ceremonies, drumming, and dancing.

2019 Our attention then turned to Winter Banquet at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Cullman. Nearly 120 people were in attendance as we shared a meal, heard inspiring remarks from our leadership, and recognized our annual Founder's Award recipients. Our 2019 Founder's Award recipients were Nicholas Crenshaw and Mr. J.T. Dabbs, III. During this event, the lodge also collected more than 340 pairs of new socks for the "The Just People Project" in Birmingham.

On February 1, as the BSA welcome female youth into all of its programs, the Order of the Arrow prepared itself for its first-ever female youth members. It would be a matter of weeks before some local young women would take advantage of their new opportunity to join Scouting's National Honor Society.

At the Spring Induction Weekend (March 1-3), we hosted 94 candidates as they completed their Ordeal, including our first female youth. The lodge spent the weekend in meaningful service at Camp Sequoyah as everyone was finishing their plans for the upcoming SR-9 Conclave at Black Creek Scout Reservation (Sylvania, GA).

Our first female youth members were, in alphabetical order: Grace Blanton, Kimberly Debus, Kate Giles, Walden Knott, Helen Parris, Lena Pelham, Kira Williams, and Caroline Worley.



A month later (April 5-7), more than 100 lodge members traveled to Black Creek Scout Reservation for the 2019 SR-9 Conclave. The theme for the event was "A New Horizon" and

more than 700 Arrowmen attended from across the section. This would mark the last time that Coosa Shows took the lead on the opening and closing shows after more than a decade of tireless service to the section shows committee. At the end of the weekend, the section elected Tyler Wright to serve as SR-9 Section Vice-Chief.

On April 13th, the lodge met at Camp Jack Wright for Hawk Day, a day of service and fellowship. The lodge later hosted two more Hawk Day events in 2019. One was held at Camp Jackson (Sept. 7) and the other at Camp Westmoreland (Oct. 5). At each of these work days, dozens of Scouts and leaders, many of them Arrowmen, donated hundreds of hours of cheerful service to these camps.

After a great summer at both Camp Comer and Camp Sequoyah, the lodge met on at Camp Comer for the annual summer induction weekend (Aug. 9-11). A total of 138 new candidates were inducted over the weekend.

More than a dozen lodge members traveled to Camp Widjiwagan (a YMCA camp near Antioch, TN) for NLS and DYLC (Nov. 8-10).

The lodge program year closed at Camp Comer at our annual Fall Fellowship (Nov. 15-17). Friday night opened with a cracker barrel social and our annual Vigil call-out ceremony. The program continued on Saturday with inflatable play structures, football, ultimate Frisbee, patch trading, a firefighter demo, the lodge officer pie-eating contest, and our lodge officer elections.

That afternoon, the lodge elected its new slate of lodge officers for 2020.: Gabe Travis (Lodge Chief), Paul Glenn (Vice-Chief of Service), John Dodd Beck (Vice-Chief of Administration), Sam Wilson (Vice-Chief of Fellowship), Zac Pate (Vice-Chief of Inductions), Jack Young (Vice-Chief of Native American Affairs), and our first-ever female lodge officers, Kate Giles (Vice-Chief of Communications).

The weekend program finished Saturday evening with a closing show in the dining hall, where we publicly recognized our new Vigil Honor recipients, installed our new lodge officers, and celebrated all that we accomplished as a lodge in 2019.

The last event for the year was the annual Ceremonies Retreat (Dec. 31-Jan 1), once again hosted by Yuchi Chapter at Camp Westmoreland.

2020 The lodge started 2020 with its annual Winter Banquet at Holy Spirit Catholic Church in Huntsville. Lodge officers and advisers spent the afternoon in a brief training event. About 120 lodge members joined them that evening for dinner, fellowship, presentation of the Founder's Award, a brief keynote from Dr. James Flatt, and a special performance from David Murphree's barbershop quartet, Eight Feet Wide.

Coosa Lodge presented the Founder's Award that evening to John Glenn and Mr. Chris Arnold.

Several weeks later, March 6-8, Camp Comer was once again host to 348 staff and participants for the annual Spring Pow-Wow. During the same weekend, Mr. Donnie Strain and Mrs. Michelle Colson attended NLS and DYLC, respectively.

Over the next few weeks, the COVID-19 pandemic would take hold across the United States and most of the country would shut down non-essential activities to help reduce the impact of the disease. The effects of the pandemic would be felt for the rest of the year, leading to the cancellation of Conclave and NOAC.

The SR-9 Council of Chiefs elected to hold a virtual conclave for the first time ever. On April 18 and 19, Arrowmen from across the section met online for "Conclave Connected", which was livestreamed on Facebook and YouTube and featured presentations from some of the best trainers across the Southern Region. During the weekend, Tyler Wright was elected to serve as SR-9 Section Chief.

The Covid-19 pandemic also affected the 2020 induction season. Induction weekends traditionally held in May and September were cancelled due to the pandemic, then were eventually replaced with virtual inductions based on new guidelines from the national committee. Coosa Lodge also held its first ever chapter-level inductions at Camp Westmoreland, Camp Tekakwitha, Monte Sano State Park, and several other locations. By the end of the year, more than 150 new members would be inducted.

In place of the cancelled NOAC, the National Order of the Arrow Committee held a new, all-virtual conference called Momentum: Spark. This 3-day virtual conference (Aug. 4-6) built upon the lessons learned from a number of virtual conclaves around the country. A group of dedicated Arrowmen, including Tyler Wright, worked tirelessly throughout the week to deliver

high-quality training and entertainment to participants across the country.

Following the success of Momentum: Spark and virtual inductions held around the country, the

National Order of the Arrow Committee held a second event, Momentum: Launch, as a national induction weekend and lodge training event (Nov. 6-7).

Key 3 History

The working relationship of the Lodge Chief, Lodge Adviser, and Lodge Staff Adviser is commonly referred to as the “Key 3”. These individuals work together to set an example for the rest of the lodge leadership. These individuals – two volunteers and one professional – are responsible for guiding the entire lodge.

For the entire history of Coosa Lodge, the Lodge Chief for the upcoming year has been elected at Fall Fellowship, starting with David Self at the 1999 Tri-Lodge Fall Fellowship.

The Vigil Honor is the highest honor that the Order of the Arrow can bestow upon its members for service to lodge, council, and Scouting. Membership cannot be won by a person's conscious endeavors.

The Vigil Honor is a high mark of distinction and recognition reserved for those Arrowmen who, by reason of exceptional service, personal effort, and unselfish interest, have made distinguished contributions beyond the immediate responsibilities of their position of office to their lodge, their Scout camp, the Order or the Arrow, or the greater Scouting community.

Under no circumstances should tenure in Scouting or the Order of the Arrow be considered as reason enough for a Vigil Honor recommendation.

The Founder's Award

Introduced at the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference, the Founder's Award was created to honor and recognize those Arrowmen who have given outstanding service to their lodge. The award is reserved for an Arrowman who demonstrates to fellow Arrowmen that he or she memorializes in his or her everyday life the spirit of achievement as described by founder E. Urner Goodman and co-founder Carroll A. Edson.

The Award is a bronze medallion bearing the likenesses of E. Urner Goodman and cofounder Carroll A. Edson, with wooden base and brass plate suitable for engraving. Also available is a special Founder's Award arrow ribbon, with a gold colored arrow suspended from a red ribbon. This award is presented annually.

James E. West Fellowship Awards

The James E. West Fellowship Award is a national recognition for individuals who contribute \$1,000 or more in cash or securities to their local council endowment trust fund. This contribution is in addition to, and does not diminish or replace, the donor's annual gift to the council's Sustaining Membership Enrollment or Friends of Scouting Campaign.

Organizations or individuals may contribute an award in honor of someone – an Eagle Scout, a Silver Beaver recipient, council president, or district chairman, or in memory of a departed loved one, business associate, Scout or Scouter.

The award is named after the first Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America who exemplified Ralph Waldo Emerson's observation that "an institution is the lengthened shadow of one man." Scouting today is the "lengthened shadow" of more than three decades of the farseeing and dedicated leadership of Dr. James E. West.

Those who are recognized by the James E. West Fellowship Award will cast their own "lengthened shadow" as they help ensure the Scouting legacy for future generations of young people and create the financial stability of the program in the twenty-first century for their local council.

Coosa Lodge presents these awards to Arrowmen who have spent countless hours furthering the ideals of the Order of the Arrow. The award is given as often as is deemed appropriate.

Distinguished Service Award

The Distinguished Service Award was created in 1940 to honor those who rendered service to the Order beyond the lodge level. The award is presented to those Arrowmen who have rendered distinguished and outstanding service to the Order on a sectional, regional, or national basis. The award is presented every two to three years during the National Order of the Arrow Conference. Since the time the first awards were presented, less than 840 Distinguished Service Awards have been awarded.

The award is a sterling silver arrowhead, bearing an arrow pointing upward and to the wearer's right, suspended from a white neck-ribbon upon which are embroidered red arrows. A white square knot embroidered upon red cloth is also available. Presentation of the award is limited; nominations are open to both youth and adult.

2009 - Dr. James Flatt

Dr. Flatt is from Huntsville, AL, and the Greater Alabama Council. He is an Eagle Scout and serves on his Council Executive Board. Professionally, Dr. Flatt is a physician. He has been a key part of the development of OA training, and worked as a main adviser to the new Train the Trainer program. "If we have an MVP among adult Arrowmen in the Southern Region, James would be ours." Dr. Flatt currently serves as the Section Adviser for SR-9 and served as Coosa Lodge Adviser from 2000 to 2004.

2012 - James Tarbox

James was inducted into Coosa Lodge in 2001 at Camp Sequoyah. He then served in nearly every aspect of the Lodge, including ceremonies, shows, the kitchen, and the trading post, before being elected as Coosa Lodge's only two-term Lodge Chief on his way to back-to-back elections as SR-6S and SR-9 Section Chief. James' experience with Coosa Shows and his success as Section Chief opened the door for him to serve as the Shows CVC at the 2009 National Order of the Arrow Conference, where he led dozens of Arrowmen in successfully planning and executing four exciting and inspirational arena shows. James is an Eagle Scout, a James E. West fellow, a 2005 Vigil Honor recipient, and a recipient of the Founder's Award in 2007.

2012 - Mr. Keith Swedenburg, as a member of Gamenowinink Lodge

Keith is a Vigil Honor member and has the District Award of Merit from Direct Service Council and Gamenowinink Lodge. Keith has served as the Southern Region Staff Adviser since 2006. According to his DSA nomination form, Keith "really loves scouting and especially the Order of the Arrow...it is apparent that the OA is his 'first love.'" Keith served as the Coosa Staff Adviser from 2003 to 2006.

2015 - Mr. Richard Gregory ("Greg") Moore

Greg was a Vigil Honor recipient and Lodge Chief of Atta Kulla Kulla Lodge as a youth before joining Cherokee Fifty many years later. Greg was prominent during the consolidation process, emerging as our first Nominations and Recognition committee adviser and one of our first Associate Lodge Advisers. After Dr. James Flatt stepped down as Lodge Adviser, Greg was chosen to succeed him.

After four years of service as Lodge Adviser, Greg resigned that post and was asked to serve as an Associate Section Adviser for Section SR-9. During his time as Associate Section Adviser, Greg found new opportunities to serve Scouting across SR-9 and the Southern Region.

Greg served as the Deputy Lead Adviser for the Day of Service Messengers of Peace program at the 2013 National Jamboree. He has also served on several staffs for national events such as NOAC, SummitCorps, and multiple NLATS Courses.

The Centurion Award

For nearly 100 years, the Order of the Arrow has purposefully recognized Scouts and Scouters who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives. Therefore, our organization's centennial provides a unique opportunity to commemorate those among us who are exemplars of the "high ideals and purpose of the Order of the Arrow."

The Centurion Award aimed to highlight "Hometown Heroes," or Arrowmen who have meaningfully contributed to the forming, maturing and ongoing operational excellence of their local lodge, and who, in doing so, inspired others to follow in their footsteps.

These recipients were presented with a certificate and recognition ribbon consisting of a red and white ribbon and a metallic totem symbolizing the centennial anniversary of the Order of the Arrow.

This award was a one-time recognition associated with the centennial anniversary of the Order of the Arrow and was bestowed by the National Order of the Arrow Committee. It was modeled after a similar program in the BSA's 100th anniversary celebration, the 2010 National Hall of Leadership. These honorees serve as exemplars of leadership, modeling to others a commitment to cheerful service as the Order of the Arrow enters its second century.

OA High Adventure Alumni

The Order of the Arrow, in its focus on service, operates five high adventure programs on the national level, each of which focuses on conservation. These programs occur at the three national high adventure bases. They are only open to youth aged 16 to 20 and are available at a substantially lower price than other programs at these high adventure bases.

The History of Cherokee Lodge # 50

Cherokee Lodge 50 of the Birmingham Area Council and later the Central Alabama Council was formally chartered on June 17, 1930. Cherokee Fifty was the first lodge chartered in Alabama and the first south of the Mason-Dixon Line. It had the largest membership in the state while occupying only two counties - Jefferson and Shelby. It had a rich history which includes many Arrowmen who branched out to other Councils to help form new lodges there.

The first Ordeal for the Lodge was held at the old Camp Andrews near present day Hoover, Alabama in 1931. The Charter Members of the lodge are Dr. J. A. Anderson; John Tillia; Billy Caruthers; Brad Wood; Carson Hood; Frank Braden; and Stanley Mate. They were the first initiated members of the Order of the Arrow in Alabama.

The Lodge name "Cherokee" was chosen for the Cherokee Indians that once inhabited the local area around Birmingham. They were one of the five civilized tribes in Alabama and brought great Native American heritage with their name. The Lodge totem was adopted in 1946 and pictured a Thunderbird with the head of an "Ivory Billed Woodpecker" once common to the area but now extinct.

In 1939, Cherokee Lodge hosted the first Regional O.A. Conference at Camp Andrews. The goal of this original conference was to spur interest in the Order of the Arrow through regional Councils. In

these early years, Cherokee assisted many Lodges in the Southeast with their organization and ceremonies. Cherokee Fifty helped start Achunanchi 135 in Anniston, AL; Alibamu 179 in Montgomery, AL and Aracoma 481 in Tuscaloosa, AL. Cherokee was a Charter Member of Area V-A that included all lodges in Alabama except Kaskanampo 310.

Cherokee Lodge was present at all Regional and Sectional OA Conferences from 1950 through 1999. The Lodge hosted conferences in 1954, 1960 and 1967 at Camp Indian Valley; 1974 and 1981 at Camp Sequoyah; and 1988 at Camp Winnataska - their last hosted conclave. Cherokee Fifty held activities at four Camps - Camp Arrowhead through 1971; Camp Indian Valley; Camp Sequoyah and Camp Winnataska. The Lodge was also home of over 16 Area/Section Chiefs or Vice-Chiefs. H. Lloyd Nelson the National Order of the Arrow Chairman was a brief member of the Lodge from 1953 until his passing in 1955.

The Lodge was also home to two Distinguished Service Award Honorees - Mr. James Johnson in 1981 and former Lodge Adviser Mr. Ken Ackerman in 1983. Cherokee was also nationally known for their Dance Team under the direction of "Chief" Zack Cross. Chief Cross was the third Vigil Honoree in Alabama, keeping his Vigil at Camp Tukabatchee in 1952. He went on to a lifelong career as professional scouter and made the dance teams through the lodge known nationwide.

Key 3 History

The working relationship of the Lodge Chief, Lodge Adviser, and Lodge Staff Adviser is commonly referred to as the "Key 3". These individuals work together to set an example for the rest of the lodge leadership. These individuals – two volunteers and one professional – are responsible for guiding the entire lodge.

The Founder's Award

Introduced at the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference, the Founder's Award was created to honor and recognize those Arrowmen who have given outstanding service to their lodge. The award is reserved for an Arrowman who demonstrates to fellow Arrowmen that he or she memorializes in his or her everyday life the spirit of achievement as described by founder E. Urner Goodman and co-founder Carroll A. Edson.

The Award is a bronze medallion bearing the likenesses of E. Urner Goodman and cofounder Carroll A. Edson, with wooden base and brass plate suitable for engraving. Also available is a special Founder's Award arrow ribbon, with a gold colored arrow suspended from a red ribbon. This award is presented annually.

The History of Achunanchi Lodge # 135

Achunanchi Lodge 135 was located in Anniston, Alabama as part of the Choccolocco Council #1. It was formally chartered on September 29, 1938 and held its first Ordeal in 1940 with the help of Cherokee Lodge 50. The word Achunanchi is Choctaw, which means "Young Wise Men". The first totem of the Lodge was an Owl but later changed to a Thunderbird.

The Lodge was known for its service and dedication to its Camps. Originally the Lodge operated out of Camp Zinn near Anniston and then moved in late 1964 to Comer Scout Reservation near Mentone, AL. A seven acre lake at Camp Comer is named Lake Achunanchi in honor of the Arrowmen who helped build the new Camp. Their efforts and financial contributions are still felt to this day as Camp Comer is the center of operations for Coosa Lodge.

Achunanchi attended all Area/Section Conferences from 1952 to 1999. Camp Zinn hosted conferences in 1958 and 1961. In 1966, 1970, 1975, 1982, 1989, and 1992 were hosted at Camp Comer. The Lodge serviced 11 counties in the northeast corner of Alabama and was known for their Dance Teams and Trail Service work. The DeSoto Scout Trail; Thunderbird Trail, Odum Scout Trail and Chinnabee Trail were all completed in part due to the work of the Arrowman of Achunanchi Lodge.

The Founder's Award

Introduced at the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference, the Founder's Award was created to honor and recognize those Arrowmen who have given outstanding service to their lodge. Distinguished Service Award

The History of Kaskanampo Lodge # 310

During summer camp of 1945 at Camp Westmoreland, eighteen Scouts and Scouters were selected to become charter members of the new Order of the Arrow lodge in the Tennessee Valley Council. The new candidates were inducted on July 8th, 1945 at Camp Westmoreland by members of Itawamba Lodge 235 from Jackson Tennessee. The original charter, dated July 11th, 1945, proclaimed the new lodge's name and lodge number: Kaskanampo 310, chosen after the name of a tribe of Kosati Indians who were native to the area, and translated means "men warriors". The new members chose the mussel shell as the lodge totem, because of the importance of freshwater mussels to the native Americans in this area.

The Lodge grew rapidly throughout the council, and in 1949 served as host to the first Regional Fellowship Conference, held for the lodges in the eastern half of Region 5 at Monte Sano State Park in Huntsville, Alabama. The lodge attended the second Fellowship Conference in 1950 at Camp Pellissippi near Knoxville, Tennessee, where it was decided that the region would be divided into areas for further conferences. Kaskanampo became a charter member of Area B of Region V(5), along with Wa-Hi-Nasa 111 of Nashville, Sequoyah 184 of Johnson City, Tennessee, and Pellissippi 230 of Knoxville, Tennessee.

Area V-B first met annually in 1951, and Kaskanampo Lodge first hosted the annual conclave in 1955 held at the Russell Erskine Hotel in Huntsville, Alabama. During that time, the host lodge was responsible for generally served as the Area Chief for that conference; thus Kaskanampo's Chief Bill Bowen served as Area Chief. The Lodge continued to grow, and was divided into 3 chapters to facilitate unit elections and service; the CAD Chapter(Cullman, Athens, Decatur), Maja Chapter (Huntsville), and Muscle Shoals (Tri-Cities) Chapter. Lodge meetings were

held quarterly at Camp Westmoreland, and to be eligible for Brotherhood, Ordeal members were required to attend at least 3 of the 4 meetings. The Lodge also began having a winter "Roundup", similar to our fall fellowship, as well as an annual winter workday at Camp Westmoreland, performing specific projects for the camp. In 1960, Kaskanampo again served as host lodge to the area Fellowship Conference, and Robert Womack, Kaskanampo Lodge Chief, served as Area Chief. Participants stayed at the Muscle Shoals Hotel in Sheffield, Alabama, and training sessions were held at the First Methodist Church, with ceremonies and the campfire held at Camp Westmoreland. The conference theme was "Tree of Service", and Kaskanampo conducted both the Ordeal and Brotherhood ceremonies.

The Lodge's first newsletter, The Kaskanampo, was first introduced in the late '50's, and was later named Among the Kaskanampo. The name was changed to The Mussel Shell in 1961, and the first edition (October 21, 1961) told news of the new 6 chapter lodge structure: Maja (Huntsville), Arroaco (Athens/Decatur), Muscle Shoals (Tri-Cities), Wischiki (Cullman), Jackson (soon changed to Chiaha - Scottsboro), and the new Cherokee Chapter for Black Arrowmen within the council, which met at Camp Drake, the council's Black Scout Camp. During this time, 5 Ordeals were held throughout the year, 4 at Camp Westmoreland and 1 at Camp Drake.

Kaskanampo won the attendance award at both the 1961 and 1962 Area V-B fellowships, by bringing the most members to the conclave both years. At the 1962 conclave campfire, the Lodge presented a pageant depicting the legend of the Order of the Arrow; it was so well received that it was presented at the 1963 and 1965 National OA Conferences. For the 1963 Area V-B conclave, Kaskanampo members made and presented

totem shields to each lodge in the area; these shields were used at future conclaves to display coup feathers achieved by winning awards at the conclave. At the 1963 Area V-B conclave at Camp Buck Toms in Tennessee, Kaskanampo won every available award: Attendance, Team Dancing, and Solo Dancing.

In December 1963, the Lodge held a service encampment at the new Camp Jackson, and helped create the initial trails and campsite areas. Kaskanampo members were instrumental in helping develop the new wilderness camp into a summer camp facility, which was first used as a summer camp in 1970.

Kaskanampo served as host lodge to the 1964 Area V-B conference, held at Redstone Arsenal, and a record 322 were in attendance from the 5 participating lodges. Mr. John Dowe, the Area V-A Adviser, was the keynote speaker, and at the area elections, Kaskanampo's Vice-Chief Morgan Weed was elected Area Chief, and presided over the 1965 Area Conclave in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Prior to moving to Decatur, Morgan was a member of Cowikee Lodge, and served as Area V-A Chief in 1962. Kaskanampo's Arroaco Chapter won the Campcraft fair at the conclave with their presentation of Indian Corn (Yuchi) Soup and "hole-less" doughnuts! At the end of the conclave, it was announced that Area V-B would become Area V-D, and a 6th lodge was added to the area Itawamba 235 of Jackson, Tennessee.

1965 marked the Lodges' 20th Anniversary, and the lodge's charter members were invited to a banquet at the Second Ordeal marking the occasion. At the 1965 Area V-D conference in Chattanooga, Kaskanampo won the display booth competition, and placed 2nd in Team Dance. Plans for a Lodge Building were first introduced in early 1965, and the Lodge sold gummed-back address labels to help raise the necessary funds to construct the building. The Maja (Huntsville) Chapter was divided into Caddo and Micco Chapter due to the large number of members. A total of 58 Kaskanampo members, the nation's largest contingent, attended the 1965 NOAC at Indiana University, and most members participated in staff positions ranging from discussion group leaders, to Band/Chorus participants. At this conference, Kaskanampo won the Exhibits "Sweepstakes Award", and placed Honorable Mention in both

the Camping Carnival and the Variety Show.

At the 1966 Area V-D Conference, Kaskanampo Lodge Chief Terry Stull was elected Area V-D Chief, which marked the first Friday-to-Sunday conclave program. The ground was finally broken for the Lodge Building at Westmoreland, and was subsequently completed in 1967. Also in 1967, the Lodge received the National Award for Excellence for Region Five, as part of the 1967 Onward Arrowman Plan. Kaskanampo members traveled to Chattanooga, Tennessee to conduct a "Train the Trainer" session for Talidandaganu' Lodge officers, helping them to become a more active lodge. The first annual winter Banquet was held on December 30th, 1967 at the new OA Lodge Building at Camp Westmoreland.

In 1968, the lodge inducted a record 406 new members, and each chapter was responsible for conducting its own training session. The Muscle Shoals Chapter was divided into 2 chapters: Minewa Chapter and Yuchi Chapter. 24 Kaskanampo members attended the 1968 Area V-D Conference hosted by Sequoyah Lodge 184 of Johnson City, Tennessee.

In 1969, the lodge dance team attended the Southeastern Indian Festival, hosted by Quinipissa Lodge 479 in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The bar-b-que pit was completed at the annual spring work day at Westmoreland. Kaskanampo sent a delegation of 33 to the 1969 Area V-D conference at Camp Buck Toms in Tennessee, and 31 members attended the 1969 NOAC, where the lodge displayed a booth highlighting the history of the Native Americans in Alabama. At this NOAC, Kaskanampo Lodge Lay Advisor Mr. Bill Ingersoll received the Distinguished Service Award for his years of service to the lodge and Area.

1970 was a banner year for Kaskanampo, as again the lodge hosted the 1970 Area V-D Conference at Camp Jackson, and Kaskanampo's Kevin Millen served as Area Chief. The event was attended by over 500 Arrowmen, making it one of the largest conclaves to date, and many agreed it was one of the best yet, despite the constant downpours of rain (sound familiar?). The conclave preparations served as a final push in readying Camp Jackson for its first year as a Scout summer camp in 1970, and at the 3rd annual lodge fellowship banquet on December 28th, a special 25th anniversary lodge flap was available for members who were in attendance.

Kaskanampo Lodge had another big in 1971, as the lodge was named a "National Standard Lodge" for both 1970 and 1971; Kaskanampo was the only lodge in Region Five (AL, MS, TN, AR, LA) to receive this award two years in succession. Also, at the 1971 NOAC, Kaskanampo was presented with the E. Urner Goodman Camping Award, and was the first lodge in Region Five to achieve this honor, which was presented to only one lodge per region.

In 1972, the Arroaco Chapter was divided into Sequoyah Chapter for Athens, and Arapaho Chapter for Decatur. The first Lodge Pow-Wow was held on April 1st at Camp Westmoreland, and dance team competition was done to choose which team would represent the lodge at the Area conference. 30 Kaskanampo members attended the last Area V-D conference in 1972 at Boxwell Scout REservation and placed second in dance competition. Kaskanampo also received an award for their presentation of "The Vanishing Apache", a Native American play depicting the Apache Nation. This program was also performed at the 1972 Area V-E conference at Camp Tuckabatchee, and on several occasions within our council, including the 1972 Baden-Powell Council Jamboree. The Caddo Chapter members who were part of the presentation team had a special patch on a neckerchief which they wore to distinguish themselves as members of this team.

As a result of Regional realignment in 1973, Kaskanampo Lodge became a member of the new Southeast Region Section 4-A, meeting for the first time with the other lodges of Alabama at the 1973 SE 4-A conclave at Camp Horne. At the 1976 Section conclave, Kaskanampo's Tim Kimbrell was elected Section Chief to plan and preside over the 1977 SE 4-A Conclave which was hosted by Kaskanampo at Camp Westmoreland, and Kaskanampo's David Allen served as Section Secretary. During the Ordeals that year, the "Elangomat Clan" system was first used, and 58 new members were inducted. The 1977 NOAC at UT - Knoxville was attended by 8 lodge members, the largest contingent from any lodge in Alabama. The first Lodge "Fall Fellowship" was held in 1977 at Camp Jackson, (prior to this event had been called the Lodge "Pow-Wow" and was held at Westmoreland), and 32 members attended the weekend event.

In 1978, the lodge changed its flap design for the

first time in 20 years, issuing the "Indian and Canoe" design with a FDL to comply with National guidelines. This new flap was available at the Spring Fellowship at Camp Jackson. Kaskanampo's Chief Tim Hall was elected Section Chief at the 1978 SE 4-A Conclave to preside over the 1979 SE 4-A Conclave held at Camp Tuckabatchee.

Kaskanampo again hosted the SE 4-A conclave in 1984 at Camp Jackson, and the lodge did an excellent job of hosting this event despite almost constant rain throughout the weekend. In 1986, the lodge issued a flap with a pink background as a fund-raiser, and over 3000 was raised to purchase a new computer for the Council office. In addition, the last gold FDL "Indian and Canoe" flaps were sold at the annual fall fellowship, and the new "underwater shell" flap was first available at the December Lodge banquet held at Joe Wheeler State Park.

During 1987, the lodge participated in the first Council "Beaver Day" at Camp Jackson, helping with several needed projects. 43 Kaskanampo delegates attended the 1987 SE 3 Section conclave at Camp Tuckabatchee, where Kaskanampo's Chief Brennan Smith was elected Section Vice-Chief and the Lodge placed first in the OA Olympics and OA Jeopardy. Later that year, the Lodge constructed a bar-b-que pit at Camp Jackson, and completed a landscaping project around the Council office in Huntsville. The 1987 Fall Fellowship returned to Camp Westmoreland for the first time in several years, and the annual winter banquet saw the first time in several years, and the annual winter banquet saw the first lodge "patch auction", which raised over \$1,100 placed toward the construction of a new trading post at Camp Jackson.

In 1988, the Lodge earned "National Honor Lodge" certification for the first time since 1971, and the "Honor Chapter Award" was introduced, renamed the Myron W. Cole Award in 1989 after this dedicated brother passed away in the fall of 1988; 3 chapters earned it in its first year: Arapaho, Caddo, and Chiaha. Work continued on the new Trading Post and the new Health Lodge at Camp Jackson, which was ready by the summer of 1989. At the 1989 SE 3 Conclave held at Comer, Kaskanampo's Vice-Chief Mike Sutton was elected as Section Chief, and Kaskanampo was awarded "Best Demonstration" for their presentation of Indian Headdress Neckerchief

Slide construction, led by Dr. Tom Willis.

The Order celebrated its 75th Anniversary in 1990, and 90 Kaskanampo members earned the OA 75th Anniversary Award. 50 Lodge delegates attended the 1991 Section conclave, and Kaskanampo placed 2nd in the volleyball competition and 3rd place in the ceremony competition.

1993 brought another Region realignment, and Section SE 3 was renamed Southern Region Section 8, adding Chattahoochie Lodge 204 and Ini-To Lodge 324 to the ranks. SR 8 first met at Camp Alaflo, where the Kaskanampo Ceremony Team placed first in the ceremony competition. At the 1994 SR 8 Conclave, Kaskanampo's dance team placed 2nd, and the ceremony team placed 4th in competition. The ceremony team also achieved "National Merit Status" in competition at the 1994 NOAC, and Lance Putman finished 5th in the Vigil Ceremony competition. Tragically, Camp Jackson's Ranger George Smith was killed in a camp accident in August '94, prompting the

Lodge to dedicate the ongoing restoration of the Camp's Administration Building to his memory, naming it the George W. Smith OA Lodge and Training Center.

Kaskanampo Lodge celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 1995, and several commemorative patch issues were available throughout 1994 and 1995. In addition, a 50th Anniversary Participation Award pin was awarded to members who attended at least 4 of the 7 Lodge events during the anniversary year; these were presented at the 1995 Lodge Banquet. The Ceremony Team again proved to be Section Sr 8 Champions at the 1995 Conclave, and the OA Jeopardy team finished a close second. The year was filled with preparation and anticipation of the 1996 SR 8 Conclave, hosted by Kaskanampo at Camp Jackson. As in the past, the rains came but did not dampen the spirit of fellowship shared by the 454 participants, and many commented that it was one of the best conclaves ever. The Lodge also had 30 delegates at the 1996 NOAC, and placed 2nd in the basketball competition.

The Vigil Honor is a high mark of distinction and recognition reserved for those Arrowmen who, by reason of exceptional service, personal effort, and unselfish interest, have made distinguished contributions beyond the immediate responsibilities of their position of office to their lodge, their Scout camp, the Order or the Arrow, or the greater Scouting community.

Under no circumstances should tenure in Scouting or the Order of the Arrow be considered as reason enough for a Vigil Honor recommendation.
